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Introduction.

The Birds Of South Gloucestershire celebrated its fifth anniversary this year 2010 and it is only now after five years of modification, alteration, re-structuring and research beginning to look something like the original concept first considered way back in 2005.

The original idea was hatched after seeing several Common Crane in the Tortworth area in February 2003 and wondering just how many previous records had occurred in S. Glos. It was then that I realised just how difficult it was to access 'easily' the information I was looking for. I could see no easy way around the problem, information needed to be collated and laid out in a resource that anyone could use...

So, after eighteen months of research the plan finally came to fruition with the launch of TBOSG. Research involved a tremendous amount of time trawling through a number of publications which included Avon Bird Reports, the Proceedings of the Bristol Naturalists Society, the extensive and meticulous notes of Howard H Davis a local naturalist and ornithologist (who incidentally was the founder member of Slimbridge Wildfowl Trust, president of the Bristol Naturalists Society and farmed at Little Stoke in South Gloucestershire until 1957), several books, weeks of contacting local birders and endless hours of sifting through information on the inter- web!

The 2010 S. Glos report is packed with information and fantastic photographs kindly donated by an ever increasing number of local birders, so it's a huge thanks to them for their generosity and most welcome support.

Other Sightings:

The first record for the Marshfield patch was seen on February 27th when it was inadvertently flushed from 'Big Pond' to trees in Gunning's Wood along Broadmead Brook in the Shire Valley. Two were seen at Heneage Court Pools, Falfield on November 6th and single birds were seen in the Shire Valley on Broadmead Brook on December 5th and on the Streamside Walk at Thornbury on December 26th.

White Stork - *Ciconia ciconia* (2) 2

Two were seen in flight heading south over Northwick Warth on September 12th. Not only does this occurrence constitute the highest count for S. Glos it also represents the first record for the Severnside patch.

Spoonbill - *Platalea leucorodia* (8) 1

A 1st winter was seen in flight over Thornbury Yacht Club in the morning on December 2nd. This is the latest date for this species in S. Glos by around three months.

SWANS

Whooper Swan - *Cygnus cygnus* (14) 2

Two, an adult and a probable juvenile were seen in flight down river past Oldbury Power Station at 09:55 on October 16th and were subsequently seen past New Passage just five minutes later at 10:00.

GEESE

Greenland White-fronted Goose - *Anser albifrons flavirostris* (0) 2

Two were watched in flight south-west past Littleton-on-Severn at 09:17 on October 17th. A short account of this occurrence is set out in the articles.

Barnacle Goose - *Branta leucopsis* (32) 107

A party of twenty-five flew up river past Severn Beach at 13:30 on January 25th and were subsequently seen grazing on Northwick Warth. All 25 were still present on January 26th and were noted flying past Oldbury Power Station on the 27th. Two were seen in flight heading north-east past Northwick Warth in the morning on April 12th but on December 7th the highest count for S. Glos, a magnificent 80, were seen in flight upriver past Oldbury Power Station.

Pale-bellied Brent Goose - *Branta bernicla hrota* (21) 1

Just one was seen with fifty-four Dark-bellied Brent Geese at Severn Beach on March 21st.

Ruddy Shelduck - *Tadorna ferruginea* (12) 3

Two were seen in flight up river past Oldbury Power Station on January 8th. An adult male was present just inside the S. Glos boundary at ST: 691 691 near the public house at Swineford around 10:00 on April 15th.

DUCKS

Mandarin - *Aix galericulata* (255) c.16

A drake was seen on Kingsgate Park Lake, Yate at lunchtime on January 18th and probably the same bird was present at lunchtime on February 16th at Yate on Cooper's Factory Lake. A male was seen at Chipping Sodbury on March 28th. A female was flushed from Broadmead Brook in the Shire Valley on April 16th. It was seen to fly into Gunning's Wood where it presumably 'landed' in trees there. This occurrence represents the first report of this species for the Marshfield patch. A male was present early morning on Kingsgate Park at Yate in October on and off from the 6th to the 20th with a brief excursion to nearby Coopers Lake on October 10th. On October 21st at least ten were present on Heneage Court Pools including seven males and three females. A male was seen east of the Lock Keeper near Keynsham (opposite boatyard) on the Avon at 16:00 on October 24th and presumably the same male was noted on the R. Avon at Swineford on December 30th.

Green-winged Teal - *Anus carolinensis* (1) 1

A male was seen on January 27th on Lagoon I at Oldbury Power Station before being flushed onto the tidal reservoir later to return to Lagoon I at high tide. Both records come from Oldbury Power Station but this one represents the latest date for this species in S. Glos.

Garganey - *Anus querquedula* (74) 1

One, a juvenile, was seen on the estuary at Oldbury Power Station between September 18th - 20th where it frequented Lagoon III and the lake. It or another was also seen at the same site on October 2nd.

Scaup - *Aythya marila* (c.40) 1

A drake was noted off New Passage in the afternoon on December 2nd.

Smew - *Mergellus albellus* (10) 1

A 'redhead' was present off New Passage between 13:15 and mid-afternoon on November 28th.

Red-breasted Merganser - *Mergus serrator* (c.60) 1

A female was seen off Severn Beach on November 12th.

Goosander - *Mergus merganser* (c.60) 37

A male and female were present on the River Avon at Hanham opposite the 'Chocolate Factory' on January 2nd and on January 30th were noted near the Lock Keeper at Keynsham. A male was seen in flight down river at Shepperdine on January 16th. Five 'brown heads' flew upriver past Severn Beach in the morning on November 14th and continued north over the Second Severn Crossing. Nineteen were seen heading north across the river near Oldbury Power Station on December 2nd. A female was seen on the R. Avon near Swineford and a further nine flew high down river past Oldbury Power Station on December 30th.

The record of 19 from Oldbury Power Station on December 2nd represents the highest count for this species in S. Glos.

RAPTORS

Red Kite - *Milvus milvus* (c.60) c.25

The best year ever for Red Kite in S. Glos thus far with over twenty-five birds noted and nearly thirty bird days achieved. 2010 was also notable for both the latest date for this species and the highest count! The latest was on December 25th near Thornbury Castle and the highest count at Overscourt Plantation, Siston on April 10th when a very impressive four were present.

Individuals were seen in both January and February at Shepperdine and Almondsbury. March, April and May all scored six of the best with numbers generally around one or two monthly for the rest of the year with the exception of a blank in October.

Black Kite - *Milvus migrans* (1) 1

The second S. Glos record was seen on the salt marsh at Severn Beach around 09:55 on March 18th. It was watched by two lucky observers and was seen to leave the salt marsh being mobbed by corvids and Buzzard drifting east over the station and Orchard Pools. This occurrence represents the earliest date for this species in S. Glos.

Marsh Harrier - *Circus aeruginosus* (23) 6

A 2nd summer male was seen at Severn Beach on April 11th in the evening. A second bird was seen just five days later flying north over the Second Severn Crossing at Severn Beach early morning on April 16th and a cream crowned bird flew east from Severn Beach at 12:35 after initially being watched flying up the estuary from the south-west on May 4th. In autumn a 2nd summer male was seen over Oldbury Yacht Club towards Littleton-upon-Severn at 09:10 on August 15th and a female was seen at Aust Warth on October 12th at 16:40. One winter bird, an adult male, was seen a little way inland at Shepperdine on December 1st.

Hen Harrier - *Circus cyaneus* (24) c.6

In the first winter period a bird was seen on January 17th at 16:00 over Northwick Warth. In autumn a ringtail was watched on Northwick Warth, New Passage late afternoon on October 13th. Another ringtail was seen from midday until dusk on October 18th in the Shirehill area near Plough Farm where it occasionally drifted into S. Glos and probably the same bird was present in fields at the eastern end of Rushmead Lane on November 14th & 15th. In the second winter period an adult male was seen over Northwick Warth, a ringtail was seen in flight over Lagoon III at Oldbury Power Station and then towards Thornbury Yacht Club at 13:20 on December 14th and an immature bird was present at Aust Warth on December 24th at 13:40 and appeared to go to roost there. On December 26th the same or another was noted mid-channel off New Passage at 12:15 and represents the latest date for this species.

Goshawk - *Accipiter gentiles* (c.15) 5

A male and female returned to the breeding site in S. Glos and were noted in the first week of March. Unfortunately they failed to establish and sadly breeding was unsuccessful. Two, a male and female were seen over Yate and Westerleigh Common at 11:45 on April 13th then south-west towards Coalpit Heath. An unconfirmed report was received of one flying across the estuary from Gwent towards Aust Warth at 13:00 where it was seen by three observers circling before departing north on October 18th.

Osprey - *Pandion haliaetus* (21) 1

A spring migrant was seen flying in off the estuary at Chittingen Warth later to be seen over Orchard Pools near Severn Beach mid afternoon on April 23rd.

GAME**Quail - *Coturnix coturnix* (Scarce) c.17**

The first bird of the year was heard calling at around 20:30 on June 2nd in the Marshfield area, north of the Middledown Road about 400m east of the A46 at ST: 750 746. June peaked at seven bird days throughout the month. July was a little more productive with sixteen bird days and the highest count for the year, ten birds on the 18th. Numbers started to fall away through the autumn but a late flurry saw three near Shirehill Lane on October 18th.

CRANE**Common Crane - *Grus grus* (8) 1**

A total of nine birds have been recorded since the first in 2000. This years welcome addition was seen in flight heading north over Aust Warth around 09:30 on March 2nd.

WADERS

Avocet - *Recurvirostra avosetta* (c.80) 3

Three were seen in the Northwick Warth/ New Passage area at 08:10 on March 23rd.

Purple Sandpiper - *Calidris maritima* (c.250) 1

It was nearly the end of the year before the only bird of the year was seen mixing with Turnstone near the 'pipes' south of Severn Beach on December 13th. Becoming even scarcer this is the first record in S. Glos for four years!

Jack Snipe - *Lymnocyptes minimus* (c. 250) c.17

The first winter period brought birds from Northwick Warth, Shepperdine and Westerleigh Common with a maximum of two birds on Northwick Warth in February. Birds continued to be seen into March with individuals at Oldbury Power Station, West Littleton and Severn Beach. Absent then until October they returned to the salt marsh on Northwick Warth where up to three were present throughout the month. Others were recorded in one's and two's at Hill Flats above the Windbound near Oldbury Power Station and on Aust and Littleton Warth's. The only non coastal report came from Broadmead Brook near Ebbdown Farm at Marshfield in December.

Spotted Redshank - *Tringa erythropus* (c.80) 6

Six Spotted Redshank were called this year with the earliest ever record seen near the Windbound at Shepperdine on February 27th. All other reports are from the autumn with birds at New Passage, Severn Beach and Northwick Warth in September. The last of the year was watched as it flew from the yacht club to Lagoon III at Oldbury Power Station on October 2nd.

Wood Sandpiper - *Tringa glareola* (20) 1

Just one this year, a juvenile present on Northwick Warth at New Passage for two days in August on the 26th - 27th.

SKUAS**Pomarine Skua - *Stercorarius pomarinus* (c.145) 2**

Two pale morph birds with full 'spoons' were seen from Severn Beach at 07:55 on April 30th and were seen to drift high south-west.

Arctic Skua - *Stercorarius parasiticus* (c.650) 11

A dark morph was seen off Severn Beach on March 30th, two dark morph's were seen there on April 28th with five, two pale, two dark and one intermediate present there on April 30th. Two were noted upriver past Oldbury Power Station at 07:15 on May 15th and a juvenile flew past Severn Beach late afternoon on November 11th.

Skua Spp - *Stercorarius spp* (c.20) 1

One unidentified bird but probably a Long-tailed Skua was seen off Severn Beach on September 14th.

GULLS

Mediterranean Gull - *Larus melanocephalus* (c.350) c.22

In the first winter period just one bird was seen at Oldbury Power Station in fields to the south-west of Lagoon III on January 24th. No reports were received until a summer adult was seen off New Passage on June 30th. A glut of birds were noted in both July and August ranging from juveniles to full summer adults with counts of twenty-one and eighteen respectively. The lion's share was on Severnside mostly in the New Passage area but birds were seen at Oldbury Power Station, Littleton-on-Severn, Littleton and Aust Warth's. Numbers dropped dramatically from September onwards with the last, an adult from Shortwood Landfill on December 17th.

Yellow-legged Gull - *Larus michahellis* (c.200) c.5

A 3rd summer was seen in the New Passage/ Northwick Warth area on April 24th and a juvenile was present also at New Passage on July 8th. The Shortwood Landfill provided several winter records with a 1st winter present on November 30th, an adult December 8th and two adults on December 21st - 22nd.

TERNs**Little Tern - *Sterna albifrons* (c.210) 1**

A juvenile was seen on the Tidal Reservoir at Oldbury Power Station for 10 minutes on September 12th. The highest count for Little Tern in S. Glos was logged in 1990 when a flock of thirty-four on May 1st were seen off Severn Beach. A total of seventy-four birds were noted up to the 9th in a remarkable passage of birds all moving upstream!

AUKS**Little Auk - *Alle alle* (c.27) 2**

Just two individuals this year the first was seen flying upriver close to the sea wall off Severn Beach at 16:25 on November 5th. It did a sharp 'U' turn as it approached the Severn Crossing before crash landing onto the river in 'Burger Bar Bay'. The second was also seen off Severn Beach at Shaft Beach on November 12th.

PARAKEETS

Ring-necked Parakeet - *Psittacula krameri* (6) c.5

The first of the year was noted at Leap Valley, Downend on May 22nd the next was seen and heard over Bellevue Road in Kingswood heading north around 20:15 on May 23rd. Another was seen near the Harvester Pub at Cribbs Causeway on September 22nd. Finally one was reported from Oldbury Power Station on November 14th for fifteen minutes. It flew over Lagoon III at 15:35. Calling loudly circled a number of times until 15:50 over shore and, at one point over to mid-river. It was always at quite a height and eventually flew off towards Oldbury village. The same or another was noted over Thornbury at 07:30 on November 24th.

OWLS

Long-eared Owl - *Asio otus* (c.40) 1

One was seen in a hedge on the north side of the B4040 just west of Acton Turville at around 19:00 on December 4th ST: 799 809.

Short-eared Owl - *Asio flammeus* (Scarce) c.7

There were nearly 50 Short-eared Owl bird days in S. Glos in 2010 with birds recorded on both the first and last days of the year. Birds were notably seen at their stronghold on Aust Warth in the first three months of the year. Absent from April through September they reappeared in October and were with us until the years end. Present generally in one's and two's the highest count came in December when four were seen on Aust Warth on the 26th.

HOOPOE

Hoopoe - *Upupa epops* (18) 2

Two of these exotic crackers were reported this year the first was a one day bird seen in a private garden on Kington Lane at Thornbury on March 28th (see Joy's narrative below, interestingly this report represents the earliest record of this species in S. Glos). The second was on a private estate at Iron Acton between July 20th - 29th unfortunately in an area with no public access.

WOODPECKERS

Wryneck - *Jynx torquilla* (16) 1

One was trapped, ringed and released on Northwick Warth, New Passage on August 30th and was seen subsequently on September 2nd & 3rd on the landward side of Northwick Warth.

LARKS

Woodlark - *Lullula arborea* (11) 1

One was heard calling as it flew north over Northwick Warth, New Passage in the morning on October 15th.

Shorelark - *Eremophila alpestris* (6) 2

Two were seen feeding on the salt marsh near Lagoon I at Oldbury Power Station at ST: 607 954 around 11:30 on January 8th. They flew up river and dropped into the salt marsh just before high tide.

PIPITS

Richard's Pipit - *Anthus richardi* (5) 1

On September 30th site bird surveyors reported one flying over Thornbury yacht club with a group of Skylark early in the afternoon.

Scandinavian Rock Pipit - *Anthus petrosus littoralis* (8) 1

One was present on the Salt Marsh south of Severn Beach on March 7th.

Water Pipit - *Anthus spinoletta* (c.60) 6

One was seen on the saltings south of Severn Beach on January 2nd & 6th. Three were seen north of Oldbury Power Station on January 17th & 25th up-river of the Windbound on the edge of the salt marsh. They were noted near the fence immediately up-river of the white house. (ST: 619 967). At least two were still present on January 18th, 23rd, 30th and 31st (an adult & 1st winter), and February 10th. Two were noted on the salt marsh below Severn Beach on January 26th with one on January 29th and February 12th - 13th. One was seen at Littleton-upon-Severn on January 30th and one was seen on Littleton Warth on March 2nd.

WAXWING

The 2010 extravaganza kicked off on November 26th when two were seen in trees in the car park on Cecil Road, Kingswood opposite the Royal Mail Sorting Office at 10:50. They were seen about half a kilometre east the following day with another six from Hanham on the same date. Reports in December came from Oldbury Power Station, Thornbury, Blackhorse Lane, Mangotsfield, St Johns Way at Chipping Sodbury, Mariston Way at Warmley, the MOD site at Abbey Wood, Filton, from Leap Valley and Sandown Close at Downend, Kingswood, Braydon Avenue at Little Stoke, Brimsham Park in Yate, Patchway and Pipits Court on Riverside Park at Severn Beach. The highest counts came from the Bradley Stoke area with thirty-nine at Wheatfield Drive on December 27th and c.40 at the Community Centre, Bradley Stoke. The last birds were seen at Patchway on December 29th.

CHATS & THRUSHES

Nightingale - *Luscinia megarhynchos* (Scarce) 3

One, a male was heard singing in the morning on April 22nd in the hedge near the 'flash' on Northwick Warth. At least one was heard on Inglestone Common on May 8th and another was heard at Lower Woods near Horton Farm on June 16th.

White-spotted Bluethroat - *Luscinia svecica cyanecula* (o) 1

An adult male was seen and heard singing on June 19th in a private garden at Staple Hill in Bristol. It was present between 10:00 and 11:30 and was photographed before its departure. This occurrence constitutes the first report of this form for S. Gloucestershire.

Importantly and in support of this superb male at Staple Hill another summer male was present at Welney Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust throughout the summer. Read a full account of this occurrence in the articles.

Black Redstart - *Pheonicurus ochruros* (c.90) 6

One was seen around mid-day at Severn View Services on the M4 near Aust on March 23rd & 24th. A female was noted at Oldbury Power Station near the Water Works on March 25th & 27th. A 1st summer male was present on April 21st at Oldbury Power Station and was heard singing on the south-west side of the main buildings. It was possibly seen and heard briefly again on May 2nd. A female/ immature was noted on the sea wall at New Passage on November 19th. One was seen on the Shepperdine side of Oldbury Power Station at 14:30 on November 27th and again on the cooling tower at Oldbury Power Station on December 10th - 12th. At Severn Beach a male was present on the steps opposite Downs Bakery on December 14th - 29th.

Greenland Wheatear - *Oenanthe oenanthe leucorhoa* (Very scarce) 2

One was seen on Littleton Warth and a male was noted in the New Passage/ Northwick Warth area both on May 15th.

Ring Ouzel - *Turdus torquatus* (c.35) c.3

A male was seen at Aust STW, Sandy Lane just north of the Old Severn Crossing on March 18th. Another was present in the New Passage area on October 10th with the same or another 1st winter at Aust Warth and cliffs on October 11th.

WARBLERS**Cetti's Warbler - *Cettia cetti* (c.23) c.4**

All presumed males were heard at Orchard Pools, near Severn Beach on April 14th and again on the 17th, from brambles along the railway line at Severn Beach on September 12th, at The Glen at New Passage on October 18th - 31st with an additional bird on Northwick Warth on October 23rd.

Grasshopper Warbler - *Locustella naevia* (Scarce) c.36

An incredible 35 plus birds were seen this year amounting to nearly fifty bird days and the one seen on April 2nd represents the earliest record for S. Glos.

The first of the year pitched up at Severn Beach on April 2nd which kicked off an average of one a day for the rest of the month. Birds were reported from Oldbury Power Station, Marshfield, Severn Beach, Cribbs Causeway and Northwick Warth. Others were noted at Lower Knole Farm at Almondsbury, Overscourt Plantation near Siston and Three Brooks LNR at Bradley Stoke. One was heard at near Wickwar around Lower Woods and the final bird was trapped on Northwick Warth, New Passage on August 30th.

A male was noted singing from Savage's Wood near Bradley Stoke on May 8th at around 07:00.

FINCHES & BUNTINGS

Tree Sparrow - *Passer montanus* (Scarce) 10

A party of ten were reported in the Dryham area in the first week of January.

Common Crossbill - *Loxia curvirostra* (c.55) 14

Five were seen heading north-east over the river at Oldbury Power Station on February 11th. One was seen and heard over Deanery Close, Warmley at 10:15 on March 4th. At Thornbury at least one, probably two were seen and heard at around 11:40 over a private garden on March 27th. Four were reported from New Passage on October 11th with a further individual there on October 12th. One was noted south over Northwick Warth on October 30th.

Hawfinch - *Coccothraustes coccothraustes* (c.70) 2

After the glut in recent years just two were reported this. The first from New Passage on October 11th with a further individual also at New Passage on October 12th.

Lapland Bunting - *Calcarius lapponicus* (c.10) c.10

Only the best year ever for this species in S. Glos an incredible ten birds were reported including a highest count of at least four birds at Oldbury Power Station on October 13th.

All winter birds from the second period of the year the first birds were all noted on the same day one on the gravel track at Cake Pill, Aust Warth, four at Oldbury Power Station, two on the salt marsh and a further two over on October 13th. The following day one was noted over New Passage and another two days later over Oldbury Power Station. One was seen at Aust Warth at 07:50 on October 20th and the ultimate bird was seen flying south-west over Northwick Warth towards New Passage at 12:30 on December 3rd.

White-spotted Bluethroat – Janet Farley

On June 19th 2010 at around 10:00 whilst watering hanging baskets in a small communal garden at Staple Hill in Bristol, pensioner Janet Farley (aged 75) was distracted by birdsong she did not recognise. Turning from her watering she was confronted, about five metres away, by a small Robin sized bird with a bright blue breast, she said ...'I could even see the white on it'.... She watched the bird for a couple of minutes in full song and bright sunshine on the stems of a mature Pampas in a shrubby boarder. The Bluethroat moved to a nearby bird table where it fed on suet then to a bird bath where it washed and drank, returning to the Pampas where it moved to the back of the plant and resumed singing. Janet mentioned ...'It was a little more difficult to see then but I could still hear it'...

At this point Janet slowly retreated from the scene to fetch her compact camera. She said... 'Whilst I was getting my camera I was hoping it would still be there when I got back'... Fortune has it that the bird was still at the back of the Pampas and still singing on Janet's return. Camera in hand she managed to capture this single photo, she went on to say...'

zoomed in a little too far so the bird looks bigger than it actually was, but it wasn't frightened when the flash went off'... Having managed that single shot she watched the bird around the garden until around 11:15 when it departed and was not seen subsequently.

This remarkably freaky occurrence came to light after a bizarre set of events; She showed the photo on her camera to someone who recognised it as a Bluethroat, that friend took his dog for a walk and bumped into Allan Chard. On hearing the tale, Allan raced back to see Janet, saw the photo, borrowed the SD card and dashed round to the local film developing shop and had two copies made! The information with a digital copy of the photo was emailed to both the BOC and Birding South Glos and news was released on June 25th 2010.

I eventually caught up with Janet at her home in Staple Hill on June 30th 2010 where she very kindly showed me the photo on her camera and took me on a tour of the communal garden pointing out the Pampas, bird table and bird bath where she watched this amazing bird!

Greenland White-fronted Goose – Matt Plenty

Two were watched in flight south-west past Littleton-on-Severn at 09:17 on October 17th. They then flew down to the Severn Bridge turned and came back north-east past Littleton-on-Severn where they were seen in excellent light and at one point less than 100 metres. They continued upriver towards Oldbury Power Station and were noted to be adult birds, 'bulky' with dark and heavily barred bellies and orange bills.

Breeding Birds in S. Glos 2010

Introduction

This report is the result of the work of many members of the above organisations, their names are at the end of this report and we are very grateful for their efforts. This survey started in 1994 and has now covered 17 breeding seasons.

Method

The method used is that of the British Trust for Ornithology's Breeding Bird Survey. The surveyors are birdwatchers who are able to recognise all the species by sight and song. They walk 2km within a square kilometre, early in the morning when bird activity is at its greatest. Two recording visits are made, one between April 1st and May 15th and a second at least four weeks later and before the end of June.

Results

The surveyors spent over 140 hours counting 14,865 birds of 78 species to establish the numbers and distribution of breeding bird species of South Gloucestershire. They visited 46 square kilometres that is 9.3% of the area.

Table 1

Summarises the total counts and percentage distribution of each species. The method of this survey does not accurately count the number of pairs breeding. However, if they are in the area in reasonable numbers during the spring, then they are likely to breed. This method avoids the need to disturb the birds by inspecting the nests.

Table 1 contains three types of birds – definite breeders with no mark, possible breeders with a * and non-breeders with **. The method of survey does not count shy, nocturnal or rare species that are known to nest or possibly nest within the South Gloucestershire boundary. Species which need to be added to the definite breeders in 2010 are Mandarin Duck, Tufted Duck, Oystercatcher, Barn Owl and Yellow Wagtail. Possible nesters not recorded in the survey were Little Grebe, Sand Martin, Dipper, Nightingale, Stonechat, Cetti's Warbler and Reed Bunting. The total of 76 breeding species and 10 possibles is a measure of the biodiversity in South Gloucestershire in 2010.
